When the rules on staying at home were eased a couple of weeks ago, we spent a few days in the Peak District, and we were rewarded with a close up of the bearded vulture which was mentioned extensively in the papers. It's a very impressive sight, with a wingspan of around 3 metres. We weren't quick enough with our own camera, but here is someone else's photo which is just as we saw it as it flew over our heads.

The main event in our family's calendar for 2020 was to be the wedding of our youngest son a couple of weeks ago. Naturally, it had to be postponed and we all now have something to look forward to next May. Fortunately, he and his fiancee have dealt with the disappointment very well.



It has been difficult, I think, for all of us not to be able to worship together in St Mary's but we are very fortunate to have so many people working hard to ensure that our church community continues to flourish, albeit in a different way. Michael and I are extremely grateful to all those who have made this possible.

The reopening of the church for formal worship recently was an important landmark for all of us. We can only look forward to times when everyone again feels able to gather together. In the meantime, we continue to be struck by the acts of kindness which are helping us all through these unusual times.
